Read the activity level before booking. Some tours involve cobblestone streets, stairs, or extended walking, while others are designed for guests who prefer a slower pace. If you have mobility concerns, ask your travel advisor about accessible options before you travel.

Don't feel obligated to join every organized tour. River ships often dock within walking distance of town centers, making it easy to enjoy a museum, café, market, or riverside stroll on your own if that's your preferred style.
